
Our Town





GIRLHOOD is a work-in-progress exhibition by artist Philippa James, who invites you into the gallery to experience the early stages of her tender new photographic project.

Please join us for drinks and discussion. Philippa will talk about the project in its current state and share her experience as a North Wall Propeller Artist.


Exhibition Opening Thursday 12 January

James, who has been The North Wall's Propeller Artist for two years, began exploring the idea of GIRLHOOD during the group show Fourteen which she facilitated and took part in for Photo Oxford 2021. As a way to understand her journey of grief, she began investigating the vulnerability of adolescence as a metaphor of how she felt straight after her father died.

Since then, James has been documenting teenage girls, all born at the start of the smartphone era and in a period of transition; gradually moving away from childhood yet nowhere near adulthood.

Every adult was once a teenager, and we can all add to the conversation regarding our own teenage years. James tells us, "I, probably like yourself, was invincible as a teenager, yet now as an adult and as a mother I see how vulnerable teenagers are." James' ability to capture the essence of teenage girls allows for honest and sensitive imagery.

Sally Fisher & Martin Smith:

Echoes of Earth and Water

Sally Fisher, painter, and Martin Smith, sculptor, root their artistic practice in nature.

Exhibition Opening Thursday 2 February 6-8pm

Sally's subject is the endless change of light on earth and

water, its subtle ebb and flow, its brightness and mysteries. For Martin, discovering a form in random stone, revealing its strengths and flaws and responding to them, is a path to a piece that, through careful form and a high finish, reveals the nature of the stone itself and the interplay of light and shadow on it. The works of both artists are echoes of their individual experiences of nature.

Sally studied at Amersham School of Art. She qualified as an Adult Art Tutor at Camden Working Men's College, where she then taught, as well as at Marlborough College Summer School and many other art centres in London, Devon and Buckinghamshire. She has exhibited widely including at the Mall Galleries, Highgate Literary Society, and Harbour House Gallery.

Martin studied sculpture at the Centro d'Arte Verrocchio and at Arco Arte, both in Tuscany, and at West Dean College in England. He developed his practice alongside working as an academic editor at the Voltaire Foundation, part of the University of Oxford. He is represented by Carey Blyth Gallery in Oxford and has exhibited widely.

Seeun Kim:

The Oxford Global Agenda Project 2023



Seeun Kim is an Oxford-based South Korean metal craftswoman, visual artist and social commentator. Seeun exhibited at The North Wall in 2021 and, since then, has made her life in Oxford. Seeun returns to the gallery to showcase a new social art project, a new collection of jewellery and works of visual art.

Seeun's social art projects combine jewellery and global social issues as a form of visual art. Using photography and film, Seeun conveys her ideas in the most inclusive way possible - using text, British sign language and English braille. Her last social art project was part of the NHS collaboration "Arts for health & well-being" and was exhibited at the Westminster Reference Library. In Oxford, Seeun has collaborated on projects for Fusion Arts and Modern Art Oxford.

St Edward's School: Vista











Vista presents work by five IB Art pupils from St Edward's School.

Hermione Brewster investigates architectural structures from different perspectives. Through assembling layers of colour and shape in a variety of ways, she analyses the structures from a range of viewpoints.

Aurea Frei explores the symbolism within her work through the lens of surrealism, taking inspiration from artists such as Catherine Bernhardt, using an array of colour paired with an impression of detail to depict her viewpoint. Her work focuses on the importance that material objects hold and how they act as symbols of personal aspects of life.

Maditha Frieser explores textures and silhouettes as wearable art, combining historical and contemporary fashion in response to Vivienne Westwood and Iris van Herpen.

Adriane Yeung investigates the symbiosis of physiology and sociocultural connotations between birds and humans, exploring a range of disciplines and media. Her work aims to challenge how we view ourselves in the world around us; striving to represent a constant cycle of metamorphoses.

Amour Jung explores the erosion of the mind over time through photography and film, taking inspiration from Aliki Braine and Ali Raza.

Peter Lawrence: Making a Mark

Known primarily as a wood engraver of detailed, black and white prints. Peter Lawrence also creates colourful and expressive paintings and collages.

The collages allow for the recycling of ephemera – an element of surrealism is created when different styles rub up against each other. Wood engraving is a slow and painstaking technique, cutting with small, sharp tools, traditionally, into endgrain blocks of boxwood. Wood engravings engage the hand, the eye and the brain. By contrast, the paintings are free from some of those constraints - more the product of the hand, the eye and the heart.

This is an exhibition that combines creativity and imagination with superb technique. It's a body of work in a wide range of styles - abstract, surreal, humorous and representational produced over the past 25 years.

Peter Lawrence is a member and former Chair of the Society of Wood Engravers and a Fellow of the Royal Society of Painter-Printmakers. He has prints in the collections of the Ashmolean Museum, the Victoria & Albert Museum and the Heilongjiang Museum of Printmaking, China.

20 Duets: Collaboration & **Improvising**

Join Peter Lawrence and Paul Dunmall for an evening celebrating their project, 20 Duets: Collaboration & Improvisation.

20 Duets is a collection of wood engravings resulting from a unique collaboration. Working in turn on the same blocks, these images were created in the spirit of Paul Dunmall's free jazz performances improvised engraving with no pre-discussion, planning or drawing on the block. Each block was begun by one engraver and then passed to the other to complete.

There are a total of 40 images, including 20 engravings, each 5 × 4 inches, printed from the original blocks by Paul L Kershaw Each verso page folds out to reveal the 20 'handover' images for each engraving plus a quotation on the theme of improvisation.

The evening will start in the gallery with a talk about jazz and wood engraving, followed by a concert by the Paul Dunmall Quartet in The North Wall theatre.

Parking: Two public car parks (OX2 7BY) are five minutes' walk from the North Wall (see map). There is limited on-street parking in South Parade.


Park and Ride: from Pear Tree (OX2 8JD) or Oxford Parkway (OX2 8HA).


