


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Daoirí Farrell

Jane Strother: Borderlands

Borderlands refers to land boundaries on a human walking scale; a stretch of coastline or field margins, travelled and pondered. As a keen walker, Jane Strother explores landscapes, noting and recording marks of human activity or intervention, evidence of changing use.

Subjects are rooted in these landscapes, including the south west coast path of Devon and Cornwall, extensive areas of fringing salt marshes in Essex and local field boundaries in Oxford.

Collecting imagery from observation, whether by drawing or photography is an important part of Jane's practice. Currently, the process involves making quick line or shape drawings while on the move, or taking photographs, as an aide memoir. Selections from this 'notebook' form an integral part in the building of a new 'space' on the canvas.


The decision making is visible, an informed process of adding, altering, removing, is seen. Each change, which can mean switching and turning panels from one side to another is made in relation to the context, the painting as an object.

The final image is mediated through aesthetic considerations of composition, colour proportion and value relationships, resulting in degrees of abstraction, always with an adherence to the original truth.

John Newberry: Recording Oxford



John Newberry returns to The North Wall this summer with *Recording Oxford*, an extensive collection of small watercolours painted between 1982-1995. Although Oxford's skyline has since been transformed, the views of the St Giles Fair, Oxford's colleges, cobbled streets and river walks remain unchanged.

John came to Oxford in 1962 to teach part-time at the Ruskin School of Drawing. He also worked at Sanders where he prepared annual exhibitions of English drawings to study 'in the hand' a large range of watercolours.

When Fine Art became a degree and the Ruskin moved

from the Ashmolean to the High Street, John became full-time with a post at Brasenose College. From 1987-1989, he was the Ruskin's Acting Master. John retired in 1989 and lives with his partner, the composer Bryan Kelly, in Somerset.

Daniel James Homewood: To Speak of Solitude

To Speak of Solitude interrogates identity through a rich visual duality. Individual discovery is set in contrast with an ethnic group experiencing the erasure of their entire cultural identity throughout this multi-layered exhibition merging image and ephemera from two bodies of Daniel's work: *Voices and Panopticon*.

Voices seeks to reconcile Daniel's difficult formative years by exploring the ways teenagers and young adults often use interests, activities and the perception of their peers to form their own identity. Voices suggests such topics as depression, love, suicide, isolation, domestic abuse, and the recognition of one's own mortality; struggles central to Daniel's development into young adulthood.

The *Panopticon* is a system of control designed by English philosopher Jeremy Bentham in the 1700's. It places a watchtower at the centre of a circular prison allowing prisoners to be observed simultaneously by a single guard. Crucially, the guard remains unseen, thus creating a sense of collective permanent observation, forcing behavioural change. Panopticon addresses the overt use of digital surveillance, censorship and oppression across the Occupied Palestinian Territories, a region with deep personal ties for Daniel through his relationship with his grandfather.
