

Amaia Salazar:

Unmasking the Mind Dreams, hallucinations, and other realities

Exhibition Opening Tuesday 9 January 6pm – 8pm

Dr Amaia Salazar (Spain, 1992) uses a critical and analytical approach to investigate how different symbolic and emotional experiences deepen the study of human cognition. Interested in studying behavioural concepts from an anthropological, historical, and sociological perspective, her artistic point of view allows us to pinpoint the origins of our thoughts – from the moment they are perceived from our senses to the way our mind interprets and transforms them into behaviours, beliefs, and feelings.

Dreams, nightmares, illusions, and hallucinations are all part of our collective imagination, which are affected by cultural and social biases in our attempt of explaining them. Concepts such as the magical, the mystical, the mysterious all have a scientific and historical basis that Amaia tries to deconstruct/reconstruct through art. By doing so, her objective is to create a new visual panorama, which will enable us to delve into the understanding of common but little-known phenomena and give them visibility through art.

Amaia's artworks are always based on artistic practice and research that are depicted and expressed through medium of photography. In recent years, she has also relied on different media types such as installations, videos, or state-of-the-art experimental techniques that allow us to directly experience the analysed perceptions.

Addy Gardner:

Imagine Wild

With photographs by Selly Gardner-Morrison



Imagine Wild is a new body of work by Addy Gardner. The work is primarily mixed media paintings and drawings however, also included in this exhibition are sculptural works and photographs of native wildflowers by Selly Gardner-Morrison. The collection evokes both a sense of our strong emotional and physical connections with nature and the wild, as well as a sense of the methods by which we 'other' it; both destroying and polluting it for material gain.

The aim of this exhibition is to raise awareness about the plight of biodiversity in the UK and the human impact on nature, focusing on rewilding as a means by which to return and revive our natural wild spaces. The show is the creative work inspired by visits to The Knepp Rewilding Project in Surrey, some of which will be completed at Gardner's residency at Wilcote Art.

The works bear witness to the importance of the wildness of nature in our imaginations and psyches. Each piece conveys a sense of the magic, adventure and the feeling of being 'at one' with the world that nature provides, synonymous with being 'in the zone' whilst working creatively. This exhibition represents a newfound feeling of freedom Gardner has felt as both an artist and a human being through her experience and learning about rewilding.

Emergence celebrates the work of the pupils studying IB Art at St Edward's School. The work exhibited ranges from cyanotypes and hyperbolic origami, to sculpture and textiles.

Anu Trew explores identity through various manipulations of the human form. Savannah Orchard also explores identity and makes very personal work looking at her Indonesian and South African cultural heritage. Alice Skilbeck looks at the art of drawing in its variety of forms and Flossy Ames explores portraiture through a digital lens. Honor Kidd-May has taken a different perspective on emergence and makes work on organic matter, focussing on the patterns and fragility of mushrooms.

The variety of media investigated in the IB Art exhibition is always one of the highlights of The North Wall calendar and this promises to be another exciting exhibition.

Catherine Ross and James Elliott: Liminal Light Temporal Space

Liminal Light Temporal Space unites artists Catherine Ross and James Elliott in presenting an innovative, interactive investigation into the landscapes around them through a contemporary lens using sound and vision.

The core of Catherine's research is a multi-sensory exploration into liminality. Liminality comes from the Latin, 'limin' meaning 'threshold.' Characteristics of liminality include indeterminacy, dissolution, and redefinition. Catherine is using concepts, materials, methods, subjects, and outcomes incorporating digital photography, social media, and sound to invoke a liminal state. Her work focuses on liminal loci (bridges, car parks, flyovers, passageways, paths, piers, sea defence systems, tunnels, and underpasses) at liminal times (dawn, noon, and dusk) with the aim of creating transformative understanding.

The working title for James' artistic research is *Temporal Place(s): Digital Representations of the Landscape* and is based around an investigation of whether the representation of temporality might lead to a portrayal of the landscape which reflects our contemporary relationship with the land we inhabit and move through.



Duncan Montgomery & George Townsend: Parson's Pleasure and the Ponds

Images of wild swimming are everywhere — from smartphone snaps on social media and professional photographs in glossy magazines, to short films and documentaries.

Parson's Pleasure and the Ponds takes a step back from this high-res world to reconnect with the bathing place as an arena of aesthetic experiment, and as a social space subject to curious changes from one era to the next.

The exhibition presents a new series of wood engravings by the printmaker Duncan Montgomery, among archive material on the history of freshwater bathing, curated by the cultural historian George Townsend. There is a particular focus on Parson's Pleasure, a men's bathing place on the river Cherwell in Oxford, active from the 17th century to 1992; and the bathing ponds on Hampstead Heath in London. The prints explore the lost meanings of these sites through figurative and landscape wood engraving, while referencing early photography and Greek statuary.

This work marks the culmination of a collaboration over three years, including a work-inprogress exhibition, Here: A Fair Resting-Place (2023) in association with the Peltz Gallery at Birkbeck University. Parson's Pleasure and the Ponds will travel on from the North Wall Arts Centre to the Highgate Gallery in London (7-20 June 2024).








